Insurance Renewals Due

Stay Covered! 2025/2026 Insurance Period

Last week, we emailed all Show Society Presidents, Treasurers, and Secretaries with the Annual Insurance Declaration for the upcoming coverage period from 31 May 2025 to 31 May 2026. This is a critical step in ensuring your Show Society remains protected under the AgShows NSW Insurance Program.

Why is This Important?

The AgShows NSW insurance program, in partnership with PSC Insurance Group, is designed to provide comprehensive coverage tailored to protect Show Societies, volunteers, events, and assets. Key coverages include:

- Public & Products Liability Insurance –
 Protects against claims arising from incidents at your Show or events.
- Association Liability Insurance Covers office bearers, Directors, and committee members against claims related to wrongful acts.
- Voluntary Workers Ensures volunteers are covered for personal accidents while participating in authorised activities.
- Industrial Special Risks (ISR) Insurance –
 Protects owned assets including buildings,
 equipment, and other valuable property.
- Goods in Transit Insurance Covers damage or loss of materials/equipment/ livestock during transportation.
- Business Interruption Insurance (Optional) –
 Provides financial support in case of
 unforeseen disruption (this is separate to the
 Rain Fund).

Submit the online Insurance Declaration by **5:00pm, Friday, 14 March 2025**. Each Show Society must submit **one** declaration to ensure smooth processing and timely coverage.

Submitting your declaration early allows PSC Insurance to leverage collective data to secure optimal underwriting terms, ensuring comprehensive coverage at the best value.

Report, Record, Resolve

Strengthening Your Incident Response

Accidents can happen, and when they do, it's crucial to report all incidents—no matter how minor—by completing an Incident Form. Thorough and timely reporting can significantly improve claim outcomes and protect your Show Society.

Key Steps in Incident Management

- Report all incidents immediately, regardless of severity.
- Document the Scene:
 - Take clear photos and videos of the location, damages, and any injuries.
 - Capture the weather conditions at the time of the incident (e.g., rain, wind visibility).
 - Note any hazards present, such as uneven ground, broken equipment, or obstructed pathways.
- Gather Witness Statements: Collect names and contact details of witnesses and obtain their written or recorded statements which have detailed descriptions of what they saw before, during, and after the incident.
- Complete an Incident Form with all relevant details and submit it to asc.admin@ascofnsw.org.au. If needed, AgShows NSW will forward it to PSC Insurance Group for review before assessment.
- **Early notification** can lead to better claim outcomes if the incident escalates.
- Leave claims handling to the insurer they have the expertise to manage legal proceedings and protect your Show Society's interests.
- If contacted by insurers regarding a claim, be transparent and cooperative—their goal is to manage the case effectively.

By staying proactive in submitting declarations and thoroughly documenting incidents, your Show Society contributes to securing comprehensive and cost-effective coverage for the entire AgShows NSW community.

ATO Self-Review Deadline

Due 31 March 2025

A friendly reminder for Show Societies that selfassess as income tax-exempt and are not registered with the ACNC—the deadline to lodge your ATO self-review return is fast approaching. 31 March 2025 is the cut-off date!

Do You Need to Lodge?

If your Show Society has an active ABN but is not registered with the ACNC, you must submit a self-review return to the ATO to maintain your income tax exemption.

How to Lodge Your Return

- ✓ **By Phone** via the ATO's self-help service at **13 72 26** Many Show Societies find this option quicker and easier!

Thinking About ACNC Registration?

Many members have reached out to the office regarding their plans to apply for ACNC registration. If your Show Society's constitution is based on the NSW Fair Trading Model Constitution, it will require amendments to meet ACNC eligibility criteria.

To proceed, you'll need to:

- ✓ Update your constitution with the necessary changes.
- ✓ Present the amendments at your AGM or call a Special General Meeting for approval.
- ✓ Submit your application to the ACNC once the changes are formally adopted.

Advocacy Update - Senate Inquiry into NFP Tax Changes

AgShows NSW, in collaboration with Agricultural Shows Australia (ASA) and our state affiliates, continues to advocate for fair taxation policies for NFP organisations.

The Senate Economics References Committee is reviewing potential changes, but no immediate legislative action has been introduced. The government has up to three months (or longer) to respond.

We'll keep you informed as we learn more.

Celebrating 150 Years!



On 8 March 2025, Cooma will proudly celebrate 150 years since its first agricultural show, marking a milestone in the region's rich farming and community heritage. The Cooma Pastoral and Agricultural Association, originally established in the 1860s, has played a significant role in supporting agriculture and rural traditions in the Monaro district.

The first official show took place in 1875 at the Police Paddock, where visitors enjoyed entertainment from a brass band that, as reported in the newspapers, "wooed them with sweet harmonies." Over the years, the event has evolved, reflecting changes in agriculture and community life. In 1883, the Cooma Ploughing Association merged with the P&A group to form what is now known as the Cooma Pastoral and Agricultural Association.

Exhibited Animal Displays

Know the Rules

Over the past months we've noticed an increase in new operators promoting animal farms and reptile displays directly to NSW shows. This is a great opportunity to introduce fresh and engaging exhibits, but it's crucial to ensure they comply with NSW regulations.

Understanding the Rules

The Exhibited Animals Protection Act 1986 governs the exhibition of animals in NSW, ensuring they receive appropriate care while maintaining public safety and high presentation standards. Under this legislation, the NSW Department of Primary Industries (DPI) must issue an authority (permit, licence, or approval) before animals can be exhibited. The licensing scheme outlines the necessary steps exhibitors must follow to house and care for their animals responsibly.

What's Covered?

The Act applies to commercial displays, including mobile animal farms, reptile exhibits, raptor demonstrations, and similar attractions. However, animals exhibited as part of show competitions (e.g., livestock competitions, equestrian events) are exempt from these requirements, as are local animal nurseries or farm displays run by schools or community groups.

Your Responsibility as a Show Society

Before engaging an exhibitor for your show, ensure they have a current certificate of authority to exhibit animals in NSW. This will include their Authority Number, which confirms their compliance with DPI regulations.

If you're unsure about an exhibitor's credentials or whether they need a permit, check out the DPI's website at: NSW DPI Exhibited Animals or contact their helpful team directly.



Stay in Control on Socials

Handling Negative Comments with Ease

Social media is a great way to promote your Show and connect with the community, but sometimes, negative comments appear. Whether it's a complaint, misinformation, or someone being difficult, how you handle it can make all the difference. Here's how to manage these situations professionally and effectively:

- ✓ Stay Calm & Professional Avoid reacting emotionally. Respond politely and factually to keep the conversation constructive.
- ✓ Acknowledge & Take It Offline If someone has a genuine concern, acknowledge their comment and invite them to contact your office directly. A simple response like, "We'd love to resolve this for you. Please call our office on [number] or send us a direct message so we can assist." This moves the discussion away from the public forum.
- ✓ Ignore or Mute Unproductive Comments If someone is just being negative without a valid concern, you don't have to engage. Muting or ignoring their comment stops it from gaining traction.
- ✓ Set Boundaries Your page, your rules. If a comment is offensive, misleading, or inappropriate, delete it. Block repeat offenders and use comment filters to prevent certain words from appearing.
- Encourage Positive Engagement Focus on constructive conversations. Respond to supportive comments, share community success stories, and highlight the great work of volunteers and exhibitors.
- ✓ Know When to Report If comments become abusive, threatening, or violate platform rules, report them. If necessary, involve the authorities.

Your Show's social media should be a space for connection and celebration, not negativity. By handling concerns calmly, taking discussions offline when needed, and maintaining clear boundaries, you can keep your page positive and welcoming for your community.

Time to Lift NLIS Compliance

Since their inception in Australia, Agricultural Shows played a vital role in shaping the livestock industry. Over time, the industry itself has grown into a multi-billion-dollar powerhouse, contributing significantly to the national economy. With this scale comes responsibility—compliance isn't optional, it's essential.

Biosecurity is more than just a regulation—it underpins Australia's clean, green, and globally respected livestock industry. Maintaining our strong biosecurity standards preserves market access, ensures industry sustainability, and protects livelihoods.

Compliance with the National Livestock Identification System (NLIS) is not just a legal requirement; it's a key safeguard enabling rapid response to disease outbreaks and preventing widespread economic and environmental damage.

Commitment to Compliance

AgShows NSW has been meeting monthly with the NSW Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD) as part of a working project to lift compliance and improve reporting. The project includes:

- ✓ On-the-ground visits to Shows
- New communications resources, check lists and toolkits to simplify compliance (to be released shortly)
- Dedicated support and guidance at the Celebrating Ag Shows event.

However, compliance is still inconsistent at many Shows.

NSW Police, Local Land Services (LLS), and DPIRD



are ramping up enforcement under the Biosecurity Act 2015 and NLIS Regulation 2017.

Penalties of up to \$1,000 per offence apply, and authorities will act where needed.

Simple Solutions: Partner with Local Agents

Many Shows have found the easiest path to compliance is partnering with local sale yards, stock agents, or processors who already have livestock scanners. If your Show is struggling to meet requirements, consider reaching out to these businesses for support.

Every Show Needs a Sporting Event NLIS Account

If your Show doesn't have an active Sporting Event NLIS account, register immediately at nlis.com.au. This is now a mandatory requirement.

An active NLIS account is part of your NLIS requirements.

Essential Steps for Compliance

- Register for an NLIS Account: It's easy! Simply provide a valid Show Society email address or have the Show Secretary send a quick email confirming membership - nlis.com.au.
- Before the Show: Organise stewards, confirm scanning equipment, and partner with a local agent if needed.
- 3. Show Day/s: Collect the NVD/TSS movement document required for livestock transport to the Show. Ensure it's completed correctly along with necessary health declaration forms.
- **4. Record Movements at the Show:** Scan livestock or complete the following excel spreadsheets:
 - ✓ NLIS form Cattle movements to and from show
 - ✓ NLIS form Sheep & Goats & Pigs MB movements to and from show
- **5. Submit Records Promptly:** Upload all data within two days (scanners are automatic).

NLIS eID for Sheep & Goats

The transition to electronic identification (eID) for sheep and goats is underway.

- From 1 Jan 2025 All sheep and managed goats born in NSW must have an NLIS-accredited eID tag before leaving their birth property.
- By 1 Jan 2027 All sheep and farmed goats moving off properties in NSW must have an eID tag.

<u>Watch the 'Where's Woolly?' video</u> to understand why the shift to individual eID is crucial.

Showmen's Guild Meeting

Country Show Cookbook


Fifth Edition - soon to be released!

Member Q&As

We receive a variety of interesting and important questions from our members, so we thought we'd share some queries over the past months.

Q: I've seen the ongoing news about avian flu — what do we need to do?

A: Avian flu outbreaks can impact poultry shows and competitions, so it's crucial to stay informed and follow biosecurity measures. AgShows NSW has a biosecurity information available on our website to help Show Societies assess risk and implement the necessary precautions. You can find the latest updates and guidance from NSW DPI and the Australian Government at: NSW DPI Avian Influenza Info. If you're hosting a poultry section, review your biosecurity plans and be prepared for any restrictions that may arise.

You may also like to implement AgShows NSW Poultry Health Declaration template.

Q: Do all Show volunteers need a Working with Children Check (WWCC)?

A: No. A WWCC is not legally required for all Show volunteers, only for those working in specific roles with children or youth. However, a Show Society can choose to implement a policy requiring all volunteers and staff to have a WWCC as a condition of participation. If you're considering this, check out the NSW Office of the Children's Guardian for a Child safe policy template pack.

Q: I'm a member of my Show Society but not on the committee. I asked to see the financial statements but was denied. Is this allowed?

A: If your Show Society is a Tier 2 incorporated association under the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW), you are entitled to access financial statements. The Society must prepare and present financial reports, including income, expenses, assets, and liabilities, at the Annual General Meeting (AGM). Under Section 51 of the Act, members have the right to inspect the association's financial records upon request, and the committee must provide reasonable access to this information.

Q: Should our Show Society have a Code of Conduct?

A: A Code of Conduct helps establish clear expectations for behaviour among committee members, volunteers, competitors, and attendees.

It promotes respect, integrity, and accountability, ensuring a positive and inclusive environment at your Show and in all Society activities. A well-drafted Code of Conduct can also help resolve disputes and uphold the reputation of your Show Society. Templates of Codes of Conduct can be found online such as the <u>Institute of Community Directors</u> or <u>Volunteering Australia</u>.


Q: Is it important to have Terms and Conditions of Entry on my ticket sales or gate entry signs?

A: Yes! Clearly displaying Terms and Conditions of Entry on both ticket sales platforms and gate signage helps protect your Show Society by setting expectations for attendees. This can cover safety requirements, prohibited items, refund policies, and disclaimers for photography, animal interactions, and extreme weather. Ensuring visibility at all entry points and online ticketing helps prevent disputes and ensures compliance with insurance requirements.

We have a few spare vinyl gate entry signs (1.5m x 1.5m) in the office, or if you're thinking about producing new signs the updated T&C wording can be downloaded here.

Q: Do you have a list of cookery judges?

A: Yes! Each year, we receive an updated list of qualified Land Cookery Judges from the CWA NSW Land Cookery Committee. This list includes judges who are available and often willing to travel. It's recommended to change judges every two years to maintain fairness and fresh perspectives. You can find the 2025 Public List in the Members Area of our website: Cookery Judges List.

Secure Your Show's Dates

The RAS of NSW has confirmed the Sydney Royal Easter Show dates until 2030 as the NSW Department of Education set school holidays up to that point.

Sydney Royal Easter Show Dates to 2030:

• **2025:** Fri 11 – Tue 22 April

2026: Fri 27 March – Tue 7 April

• **2027:** Fri 19 – Tue 30 March

• **2028:** Fri 7 – Tue 18 April

• **2029:** Fri 23 April – Tue 3 May

• 2030: Fri 12 – Tue 23 April

With these dates locked in, we encourage members to work with your Groups and consider your own long-term planning of dates.

And once done, we encourage Show Societies operating on non-owned showgrounds/Crown Land to seek to secure longer term license agreements with your land manager to ensure your dates are locked in well in advance.

The RAS of NSW has also recently written to the Minister for Education and Early Learning to request NSW School Holiday dates beyond 2030.
